WHAT *to* DISCOVER

GET TO KNOW *your city!*

Treasured gems like Rocky Point Park and the Shoreline Trail are synonymous with Port Moody, but what happens when you step off the beaten path? You discover a whole new world to enjoy.

Every corner of Port Moody has something to offer.

1. Play lacrosse or go for a summer swim at Westhill Park (203 Westhill Place). There's also a youth centre, an off-leash area for dogs, and outdoor exercise equipment for humans.

2. Tennis, basketball, soccer, hiking – you can do it all at Easthill Park (Prince Street at Union Street). In the summer months, kids can cool off at the spray park.

3. Love to run? Check out the rubber running track at North Shore Community Park (1300-block of David Avenue). Bring a two-legged friend for tennis or basketball, or a four-legged friend for a walk through the trails that connect to Bert Flinn Park.

4. Walk or cycle the Upper Backyard Trail, a multi-use path through the Heritage Woods neighbourhood that leads to technical mountain bike trails. Park in the gravel lot on Panorama Drive (next to Aspenwood Elementary School) and enter the trail on the north side of the street.



5. Basketball with a view? Swish-tacular! Shoot some hoops at Sycamore Park (100-block of Sycamore Drive), which overlooks the City from Heritage Mountain.

6. Looking for a peaceful place to sit and think? Crossroads Hospice Labyrinth Healing Garden at Pioneer Memorial Park (loco Road at Heritage Mountain Boulevard) is the perfect spot.

7. Interact with Port Moody's public art. Tidal Train, the kinetic sculpture in front of the Civic Centre (100 Newport Drive), invites participation – turn the wheel to rotate the train engine.

8. Snap a selfie in front of one (or all) of the City's 11 murals, like The Future is Behind Us (2900-block Murray Street), Coming and Going (Moody Centre Station, north end of Hugh Street), or Old Fire Hall (709 loco Road).

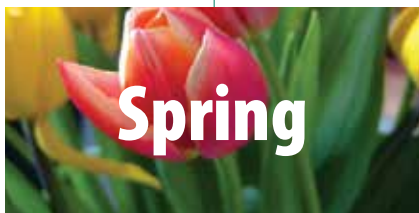

GET UP *and go!*

With more than 35 per cent of its land dedicated to green space, Port Moody has a wealth of beautiful parks and trails for everyone to enjoy. You'll find great places to play all year round.



Trails, parks, and waterfront recreation areas – Port Moody has it all.



Run, walk, or cycle through Rocky Point Park or along one of our multi-use paths. Take an extended ride through the city and beyond using the Tri-Cities Cycling Map, available online at portmoody.ca. Port Moody has 56 kilometres of trails and paths – pick your route and get going! Whether you choose the trails in Bert Flinn Park or the Alfred Howe Greenway, or head to the start of the Shoreline Trail or the Great (TransCanada) Trail, you can't go wrong. Enjoy the inlet's seemingly endless shoreline by getting out on the water in a kayak, or relaxing at Old Orchard Park while the kids dig in the sand or skip stones on the water.

Wild about WILDLIFE

We are lucky to live in an area with so much natural beauty, and with such a wide variety of wildlife. Birds, bats, seals, fish, deer, cougars, bobcats, coyotes, beavers, and bears are just some of the animals you might see when you head outdoors to explore.

While wildlife viewing is both fun and educational, please respect the animals you encounter. If you come across herons nesting (a colony of great blue herons has taken up residence at the Old Mill Site in Rocky Point Park), bats roosting, or salmon spawning, for example, please do not disturb these sensitive creatures.

If you encounter a bear, remain calm; stop and back up slowly – do not run; speak calmly, as your voice helps to identify you as human. Report bear sightings or other wildlife concerns to the B.C. Conservation Officer Service at 1.877.952.7277. Visit portmoody.ca/wildlife to learn more.

Curious about the fish in our creeks? Port Moody has two salmon hatcheries: Noons Creek Hatchery (noonscreek.org), and Mossom Creek Hatchery (mossomcreek.org). Enjoy a tour and engage in hands-on learning through their community programs and events.

Live life OFF THE LEASH



Looking for green space where your dog can run free? Check out these off-leash areas:

1. South end of Hugh Street (forested area south of Jane Street)
2. Wide gravel trail through Bert Flinn Park (starts at Heritage Mountain Boulevard and David Avenue)
3. North end of Westhill Park
4. Fenced dog run at Rocky Point Park (2900-block Murray Street, adjacent to Slaughterhouse Creek)



Keeping up with the KIDDOS

Kids love to be active! Port Moody has several parks with green space for playing tag and kicking a ball, or playground equipment for climbing, sliding, and swinging. Check portmoody.ca for a full list of parks and amenities. If you're trying to beat the heat, your children will love one of Port Moody's three spray parks, located at Rocky Point Park, Easthill Park, and Ailsa Park. Spray parks typically open over the Victoria Day weekend in May, and close in September. Older kids, teens, and the young at heart will enjoy the Rotary SK8 Park or the Rotary Bike Trials Park, both on Murray Street.

Port Moody's excellent facilities and wide variety of recreation programs make it easy to stay active and connect with friends and neighbours, indoors or outdoors, any time of the year.



Beat the heat

In the summer, Port Moody opens up its two outdoor pools, Rocky Point Pool and Westhill Pool, for lessons, recreational swimming, special events, and birthday parties.



Float your boat

Set sail from the Rocky Point Boat Launch and explore the inlet. Visit portmoody.ca/boating for details on purchasing a daily or annual pass. Need more time on the water? We also have a designated anchorage area.



Meet and greet

Over 50? Visit The Club (theclubportmoody.com), where you can enjoy daily activities like chess or knitting, and make new friends over a cup of coffee.



Get moving and keep learning with our recreation programs

Head to the Recreation Complex, where you'll find a weight room, aerobics studio, spin studio, wellness studio, hot tub and steam room, curling centre, and two ice arenas. There's also a wheelchair-accessible, rubber-composite walking/running track – seniors 60+ can use the track for free from 8am-4pm daily. At Kyle Centre, seniors can purchase a low-cost membership and enjoy a number of drop-in activities, such as bridge, tai chi, and ballroom dance.

Check out our drop-in and registration-required programs in the Happening Guide, available at portmoody.ca/recreation. The City offers programs for all ages – preschool, children, youth, adults, and seniors – and just about all interests, from swimming, skating, curling, hockey, soccer, and pickleball, to snooker, fencing, yoga, creative writing, and baby sign language.

If you have a little one who loves to move, try our drop-in Jungle Gym, for babies, toddlers, and preschoolers aged five and under. You and your child can play and explore on our jungle gym apparatus during this parent-led, open-gym time.

Need childminding services while you work out at the Rec Complex? No sweat! Check the City website for childminding hours and fees.

Drop-in activities **FOR YOUTH**

In middle school or high school? Have fun and make new friends at Westhill Youth Centre or the Youth Lounge at the Recreation Complex. Come by to play pool, ping-pong, or table hockey, and take part in special events like tournaments and movie nights.

PERMITS and licenses

You'll need a permit or licence to conduct certain activities in Port Moody. Most permit and licence application forms are available online at portmoody.ca, including:

- **building permit** – for a new building or renovations/ additions to an existing structure;
- **development permit** – required when a change is proposed to the land use or buildings on a property located within a Development Permit Area (as outlined in Port Moody's Official Community Plan);
- **business licence** – all businesses operated for profit or gain, including home-based businesses and secondary suites, require a valid licence; and
- **dog licence** – all dogs four months and older require a valid licence.



myPortMoody is a web portal that allows residents and business owners to quickly and easily access all of their tax notices, utility bills, dog licences, and business licences. You can receive your tax bill, utility bill, and business licence renewal electronically, view electronic bills for tax and utility accounts as soon as they're available, and perform detailed inquiries on property taxes, utilities, business licences, and dog licences. Go online to my.portmoody.ca and click on "Register Now" to sign up today.



Tax and utility payments

The City mails out utility bills for water, sewer, and waste collection services in January, and payments are due in February. The City also collects property taxes, which help to pay for City services, facilities maintenance, road rehabilitation, and more.

Want to avoid late payments and penalty fees? Spread out next year's tax and utility payments over a nine-month period by signing up for the City's automatic pre-payment plan. You can sign up online at portmoody.ca/paws, or pick up a form at City Hall.



Property tax bills are mailed out in May and due in July. Find out how to make your payments at portmoody.ca.



Read all about it! Want to stay up-to-date on what's happening in your city? Look for the Port Moody Focus, our quarterly newsletter, and the Happening Guide, your quarterly guide to City recreation programs, on your doorstep, at civic facilities, or online at portmoody.ca. The City also publishes a yearly calendar, which includes important dates and special events, as well as a pull-out waste collection schedule.

Bylaw enforcement

City of Port Moody bylaws encourage peaceful living by regulating the actions of individuals and businesses in a number of areas, including traffic and parking, animal control, waste collection, property development, and more.

We can all do our part to contribute to peaceful living by being a good neighbour. You can help to maintain our safe and vibrant community by learning about your rights and responsibilities, following common sense practices, and engaging in thoughtful planning and considerate behaviour. Get started by checking out the City's Good Neighbour Guidelines, available online at portmoody.ca.



Problem in your neighbourhood? Informal communication with neighbours is a simple way of addressing many neighbourhood concerns. However, if this is not a viable option, contact the City's Bylaw Enforcement team (email bylaw@portmoody.ca or call 604.469.4697) to make an inquiry or to file a complaint for investigation. COMMON neighbourhood issues



PARKING

Street parking is restricted to three hours adjacent to single-family dwellings (detached homes). This restriction does not apply to residents parked in front of their own property. Visit portmoody.ca/evergreenparking to learn about on-street parking restrictions for multi-family residential areas, commercial areas, and civic facilities in Inlet Centre and Moody Centre.



DOGS

Dogs must be on a leash and under your control at all times in public places. Scoop that poop! Owners must pick up dog waste and dispose of it in a sanitary manner. You'll find special dog waste carts at popular parks and trail head locations. Do not disturb! Make sure your pup does not bother your neighbours by barking or howling excessively.



WASTE COLLECTION

Waste collection is organized by zone – visit portmoody.ca/recycle to find out your zone and corresponding collection schedule. Place your carts (garbage, green waste, recycling, and/or non-refundable glass) at your pick-up spot on collection day between the hours of 5:30am and 7:30am only. Bring carts back indoors, or into a bear-resistant waste enclosure in your backyard or side yard, as soon as possible after the contents have been collected. Regularly rinse all carts, as well as items to be recycled, to eliminate odours that may attract wildlife.

Council meetings are open to the public and take place twice a month, on the second and fourth Tuesday, in the Inlet Theatre (100 Newport Drive). You can also watch a Council meeting from the comfort of your own home, as regular meetings are live streamed via the internet.

At a Council meeting, you can:

- ask a question or make a comment during a public input period;
- appear as a formal delegation to make a request – email clerks@portmoody.ca for more information; or
- speak during a public hearing (a formal process to receive public input on zoning or Official Community plan amendments).

SAFETY IS OUR *#1 Priority*

If you need help, Port Moody Police (3051 St. Johns Street) and Port Moody Fire-Rescue (Inlet Centre Fire Hall – 150 Newport Drive, and Glenayre Fire Hall – 955 Glenayre Drive) are here for you.





Police and Fire-Rescue

The Port Moody Police Department has been serving the community since 1913. Operations include patrol, traffic services, major crime investigations, and emergency response; community services include youth services and volunteer programs like bike patrol, as well as victim services to support victims of crime.

Port Moody Fire-Rescue (PMFR) is responsible for fire prevention and protection, rescue services, first-responder medical aid, and emergency management. Wondering about the safety of your home? PMFR proudly offers the Home Safety Program for City residents. Fire-Rescue personnel will inspect your entire home, install a free, battery-operated smoke alarm (if needed), and review a number of important safety topics. EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS STARTS WITH YOU

The City and the Province have disaster response plans in place; however, if disaster strikes, it may take emergency workers some time to provide assistance to you and your neighbours. You should be prepared to take care of yourself and your family for a minimum of 72 hours. What can you do to make sure you're ready?

1) Know the risks – Knowing the risks in your region (e.g. wind storms, wildfires, earthquakes) will help you to prepare.

2) Make a plan – Putting together an emergency plan will help you and your family know what to do in an emergency. Your plan should include things like: safe exits from your home and neighbourhood; meeting places to reunite with family and friends; and local and out-of-town/province emergency contacts.

3) Build an emergency kit – You need at least one kit with basic supplies that will help you get through 72 hours on your own, possibly without power or access to tap water. Make sure your kit is easy to carry and stored in an easy-to-reach place.

STAY OFF THE MUDFLATS

The mudflats in the Port Moody Arm of Burrard Inlet are dangerous and unpredictable. While they may seem firm, they can give way suddenly, and can act like quicksand in some areas. People and animals can sink, get stuck, and be unable to get out before the tide comes in. When you're out walking, stay on boardwalks and trails, and keep dogs on a leash. If you see someone who is stuck, advise the person not to panic. Call 9-1-1 and ask for Fire.

Getting around in Port Moody is easy! Walk, bike, or take transit for fun, fitness, and convenience.





Taking transit

SkyTrain, the region's light rapid transit system, is an easy and convenient way to get around. Port Moody has two SkyTrain stations – Moody Centre Station and Inlet Centre Station – that are part of the Evergreen Extension, which connects our city to Coquitlam and, via the Millennium Line and the Expo Line, to Burnaby, New Westminster, Surrey, and Vancouver.

TransLink, Metro Vancouver's regional transportation authority, also operates community shuttles and buses that travel within Port Moody, and between Port Moody and neighbouring cities.

Westcoast Express is a Monday-to-Friday commuter rail service operating during peak morning and late afternoon periods between Vancouver and Mission. You can board in Port Moody at Moody Centre Station.

WALKING

Many of Port Moody's shops, services, and civic facilities are located in two central and walkable neighbourhoods: Moody Centre and Inlet Centre.

Starting at City Hall, in Inlet Centre, you can walk to:

- Recreation Complex (2 min)
- Newport Village and Heritage Mountain Shoppers Village (3 min)
- Suter Brook Village (6 min)
- Inlet Centre Station (8 min)
- Rocky Point Park or Old Orchard Park (20 min)

Starting at Rocky Point Park, in Moody Centre, you can walk to:

- Station Museum (2 min)
- Moody Centre Station (12 min)
- Queens Street Plaza and Clarke Street shops (13 min)
- Arts Centre and Kyle Centre (14 min)
- St. Johns Street shops (8-18 min, depending on shop location)



It's time to ride your bicycle!

Port Moody has a number of on- and off-road bicycle routes. Visit portmoody.ca to view the Tri-Cities Cycling Map or translink.ca to view local area and regional cycling maps. Have a flat, or need to adjust your brakes? There is a bicycle service station near the parking lot at Rocky Point Park. If you're new to cycling in the area, find resources from HUB Cycling at bikehub.ca.

SHORELINE SHUTTLE

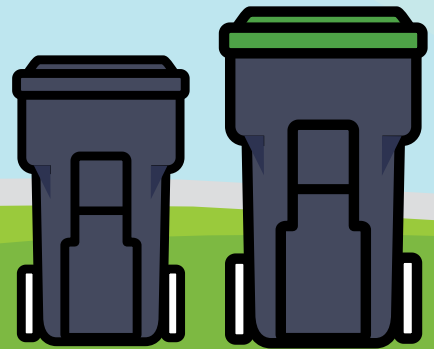
